

Put your best face forward with dental implants

Brooklyn oral and maxillofacial surgeon Dr. Steven Schwartz performed critical surgeries last month on two men who had been in ferocious fights. One had fractured his eye socket. The other had broken his lower jaw.

"It was like putting Humpty Dumpty back together again," says Dr. Schwartz, a surgeon and member of the teaching faculty at the Brooklyn Hospital Center, and Woodhull Medical and Mental Health Center, who performed the face-saving operations using tiny titanium screws and plates.

The next day, both men were successfully discharged, says the specialist, who also treats diseases, injuries, and defects of the head and face, and the hard and soft tissues of the mouth and face, at NY Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons in Brighton Beach, his private practice that sustained its own trauma during Hurricane Sandy.

"We had to gut down to the studs," says his wife, Beth.

Yet the borough-born surgeon and his staff continued to

treat patients while repairs were afoot, their hard work paying off when they celebrated the grand opening of their renovated offices, recently, complete with state-of-the-art equipment and a soothing decor of marine images taken by Dr. Schwartz, an avid scuba diver and underwater photographer.
